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COLLEGE NOTES

ALTHOUGH the Magazine is still (for the last time, we hope) in its war-time austerity dress, the College and the University are beginning to resume a peace-time aspect. The Oriel contingent numbering 27 was in our buildings till the end of Michaelmas Term, when they finally departed, thus concluding a pleasant and successful war-time association. We still have 21 Army Cadets and 2 R.A.F. Cadets reading short courses, but there will be no more of these after June 1946. Meanwhile, large numbers of ex-service men have been returning, mainly Scholars and Exhibitioners released under the Class B scheme. Mentally invigorated by their varied experiences in the war, they are throwing themselves into their studies with military efficiency and *elan*. The prospects for next October are still obscure; it is to be hoped that by the time the Magazine appears Government policy on releases from the Services and conscription of boys leaving school will have been announced.

As later pages show, College athletic clubs are getting back to normal activity, not without difficulties. The renaissance of the Boat Club and its problems are graphically described. College societies devoted to intellectual pursuits, such as the Tyndale, are slower to revive, but this may be partly due to the competition from a large variety of University societies engaged in every kind of speculation.

Some thought has been given in the College to pleasure: a College Dance on a fairly ambitious scale is being organized for Wednesday, May 8th, and we confidently predict that it will be a notable success.

The Senior Common Room has suffered remarkably little change through the war. Mr. Meade is remaining in Whitehall, where he occupies a position of great responsibility in the Cabinet Office. We wish him success in the awe-inspiring task of putting economic theory into practice. Mr. Thomson arrived in England from Egypt in the summer vacation and returned to College from the R.A.F. at the beginning of this year. We take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Vicary for his work as Chaplain in Mr. Thomson's absence. We also congratulate him on his engagement which is recorded elsewhere in this number. Mr. Markham reappeared in Michaelmas Term, but continued to be engaged in part-time work in Whitehall till the end of the year: he has now resumed the Editorship of this Magazine, and apologizes for a literary style which has been vitiated by long years of writing official minutes. Many old members will join us in congratulating Henry Bly, our S.C.R. butler, on his fiftieth anniversary this year as a servant of the College.

We congratulate two distinguished old members of the College on their election as Honorary Fellows—Mr. Justice Vaisey, K.C. (Scholar of the College 1896-1900), and Sir Gilbert Campion, K.C.B., Clerk of the House of Commons (Scholar of the College 1901-5).

Sohrab Ardeshir has at last gone down after creating a record for undergraduate residence, but revisits us frequently. He had the pleasure of playing a leading part in the Hertford and Oriel Lawn Tennis Club which triumphed in Cuppers in the summer of 1945.

A Memorial Service for those members of the College who gave their lives in the war was held in the Chapel at 2.30 on Saturday, December 1st. Mr. Vicary took the Service, and Mr. Thomson gave the address. At a lunch in Hall before the Service the Principal announced that it was intended to set up a tablet inscribed with the names of the fallen. It is important that the list of names should be complete: if anyone knows of any omission in the lists which have appeared in the war-numbers of the Magazine, the Editor would be glad to be informed as soon as possible.

COLLEGE CLUBS AND SOCIETIES

STUDENT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT

The S.C.M. initiated a Bible study group on St. John's Gospel during the Hilary Term, which was open to all members of the College and was led by the Chaplain. There was also a discussion group of a more general nature in the Chaplain's rooms on Sunday evenings: outside speakers included Mr. Justice Vaisey, who is an old member of the College, and the Rev. Herbert Waddams. Federation Week, observed throughout the Student World on behalf of the World Student Christian Federation, was a great success in Hertford and nearly £20 was collected to help the spread of Christianity in the Universities of the world. There are three events in the future which are occupying the minds of Christians in Oxford: first, the S.C.M. Summer Conference which it is hoped will be held at Swanwick again, which it is further hoped will be attended by many men from Hertford; secondly, the evangelistic campaign which a hundred members of the University are undertaking to Keighley in Yorkshire during the long vacation; and thirdly, the Mission to this University which is being planned for the Hilary Term 1947.

ATHLETIC CLUBS

HERTFORD AND ORIEL LAWN TENNIS CLUB

In 1945 Hertford once again combined with Oriol. This combination had reached the semi-finals in Cuppers in each of the three preceding seasons. With three old colours (the Captain, the Secretary, and S. Ardeshir) still in residence our prospects seemed hopeful, and we found a valuable recruit among the Freshmen in H. K. Mitchell.

We had a walk-over in the first round of Cuppers against St. John's, as they could not raise a team except on Saturdays, and it rained heavily on the first five Saturdays of term. In the sixth week we played Magdalen in the second round, gaining a narrow victory by 5 to 4. Unfortunately our Secretary was prevented by Schools from taking any further part in matches, though he did some admirable work off the field. Our side was now composed of: S. Ardeshir and H. K. Mitchell (1st pair), G. R. Bolt and J. Stitt (2nd pair), S. H. Adams and D. J. Bourne (3rd pair, both lent by the Cricket Club).

In the semi-finals we met Queen's and St. Edmund Hall. Owing to pressure of time it was decided that the result should depend on the outcome of three matches, each of our pairs playing one match against the corresponding pair on their side. This was the most exciting of our games in Cuppers as we pulled ourselves out of an extremely dangerous situation; the first and second pairs had both lost their first sets when the third pair by a timely victory put new heart into the rest of the team. The second pair went on to win two sets quite easily, and the first pair had also pulled up to set all and 5-5 in the final set, when our opponents had to leave to keep a previous appointment.

In the finals we had to play University College in a fifteen-match contest, consisting of six singles and nine doubles. Strangely enough this was by far the easiest

of our victories, for we won 8-4 with three to play. All our pairs were now combining magnificently, and after a 3-2 lead in the singles we swamped our opponents in the doubles, losing only two matches.

A celebration, in the form of a dinner, concluded a most successful and enjoyable, though altogether too short, season.

Colours were awarded to the whole Cuppers side: S. Ardeshir and H. K. Mitchell (both Hertford); G. R. Bolt and J. Stitt (both Oriel); S. H. Adams (Hertford) and D. J. Bourne (Oriel).

S. Ardeshir, ex-captain O.U.L.T.C., was not eligible to play against Cambridge but played for the University in all their other matches. H. K. Mitchell reached the semi-finals of the University Singles Open Tournament, which remained unfinished; competent judges predict that if he maintains his form he cannot fail to represent the O.U.L.T.C. before long.

HERTFORD AND ORIEL CRICKET CLUB

The Cricket Club was strengthened in the 1945 season by the return of two very old members in S. H. Adams (Hertford) and D. N. Hewitt (Oriel), both of whom had taken part in College cricket before the war. Hewitt was unfortunately prevented from playing with us regularly by his engagements with the Authentics; he narrowly missed a place in the Oxford side, being chosen as twelfth man. Adams and J. D. I. Stewart-Gray (Oriel) also played for the Authentics.

The weather did not lend itself to cricket, and as we also had to contend with difficulties in the composition of the side we were unable to repeat the overwhelming success of the previous season. We played only six College games, winning three and losing three. Adams, Hewitt, and D. J. Bourne (Oriel) were outstanding among the batsmen, and J. W. Myers (Hertford) and Stewart-Gray the most successful of the bowlers.

A notable feature of the season was the revival, long overdue, of the game with the College Servants. Fred Smith showed great guile as a bowler and was rewarded by four wickets, but the hero of the day was Bateson, who scored 25. He showed possibly even more heroism by being on the job again next day!

Colours were awarded to J. W. Myers, J. D. I. Stewart-Gray, and D. J. Bourne.

THE BOAT CLUB

The Boat Club resumed its activities in October 1945 after a long interval and in spite of grave difficulties. There had been no serious rowing since the summer of 1944, and no one in College had rowed before. A. C. Andison, who had coxed in M.T. 1939 and H.T. 1940, but had not taken part in Torpids, became Captain (and also Secretary) by virtue of being the only man in College with any experience at all. Tubbing started in the third week of M.T. 1945, in a borrowed boat and from a borrowed raft (ours had sunk) but at our own barge. The lack of a boatman and the dilapidated condition of the barge created further problems, and in the end we came to an amicable arrangement with Pembroke, who generously allowed us to share their barge and boatman.

It was difficult for the new members of the Club to get adequate practice, as most of them were Cadets and therefore only available on two or at most three afternoons a week, and the only coach was the Captain, who was for some time in a Trial Eight and was unable to give his undivided energies to the task.

In Hilary Term the Eight went out for the first time in the second week, but until a week before the races only three outings a week were possible, and the crew were rarely the same for two consecutive outings. These handicaps were, however, largely overcome by the energy of the Chaplain, who left the Isis crew to help us, and by three weeks of coaching had produced such an improvement that on the first day of Torpids some members of the crew were more optimistic about the outcome than the facts warranted.

On the first day Jesus, to our horror, came within a canvas at the Gut, but we drew clear very rapidly and were more than our distance away when they were bumped by Oriel along the Green Back. On the second day we were caught by Oriel, who came up very fast, just as we were leaving the Gut; Bow had unfortunately lost his slide after the first few strokes, but this accident probably did no more than accelerate our fall. On the third day we rowed over, with Keble, hard pressed by St. Peter's Hall, overhauling us between the O.U.B.C. and the finish. On the fourth, fifth, and sixth days we fell successively to Wadham, Keble, and St. Peter's Hall.

Of these, 2, 4, 5, and 6 are Army Cadets who leave us in June; the other four members of the crew are Freshmen who will fortunately be eligible to row again in Torpids next year.

HERTFORD COLLEGE RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

During the Michaelmas Term the Club continued its war-time combination with Oriel and achieved average success in a series of friendly matches and in the Michaelmas League. After Christmas, when the return of several ex-servicemen filled the College with Hertford men, the Club attempted to function alone, but with dismal success. In Cuppers we were drawn to play Oriel in the first round but were forced to scratch the match because the College was unable to send fifteen men on to the field. Oriel, by impressing half of their Boat Club, produced a team; but when they lost to Worcester in the second round it was decided that for the remainder of the term it would be better if the clubs maintained the war-time expedient of a combined team. This team played very well against a variety of opponents and was unbeaten, though the match against Wadham was drawn, 9-9. The members of Hertford playing in the team were: D. J. W. Bridge, P. L. Day (*capt.*), R. K. Frampton, R. S. Paul, E. D. Pendry, and P. H. Watkins. Earlier in the season both M. W. H. Gray and R. B. Murray were forced to abandon the game through ill health. At the end of the Hilary Term colours were awarded to Bridge, Frampton, Paul, Pendry, and Watkins. Bridge played consistently for the Greyhounds throughout the season and occasionally for the 'Varsity XV. He was awarded a 'Greyhound' and a place in the O.U.R.F.C. team which toured Ireland in the Easter Vacation.

HERTFORD COLLEGE ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL CLUB, 1945-6

On the whole the Club has had quite a successful season. Starting the Michaelmas Term with only four players from last year, all Oriel men, we continued our war-time amalgamation for League and Friendly matches. Our thanks are due to B. R. Brown, who captained the combined clubs, for his help in the first few weeks before the Freshmen fully realized that they had to supply a soccer team.

We improved on the previous season's record by finishing fourth in the League Competition, the team being: D. Robson, R. I. Rundle, D. G. M. Diaper, W. B. Bramwell, B. R. Brown, A. K. Sheperd, M. F. A. Jones, C. K. Haywood, D. W. Hine, G. O. Powell, F. C. Greenwood.

The best achievement of the Michaelmas Term was a fine game against a strong team from Queen's College and St. Edmund Hall, the League winners, in which we forced a draw in the closing minutes. This match showed what could have been accomplished with a full side throughout the term, as it was one of the few occasions on which we were able to field our strongest combination.

For Cuppers we had to lose the two regular players from Oriel, but managed to produce a complete Hertford eleven. Any lack of experience was offset by the laudable enthusiasm prevailing, which carried the team into the second round, by defeating New College II. Here we met a very strong St. Edmund Hall side and were soundly beaten though not disgraced. Apart from this match the Club won

all the remaining games during the Hilary Term, notably a second encounter with Queen's and St. Edmund Hall.

Several members of the College team obtained trials for the University at the beginning of the Michaelmas Term, Rundle, Hine, and Jones being further tried in the Hilary Term. Rundle played several times for the Centaurs during the season.

HERTFORD COLLEGE HOCKEY CLUB, 1945-6

During the war the Hockey Club combined with Oriel, and it was decided that in view of the small numbers of players to continue this arrangement for the normal fixtures. This enabled the Secretary to produce a reasonable combined team which, throughout the season, enjoyed a fair measure of success. For Cuppers, however, we had to rely on our own resources. In the first round we played Worcester with a relatively inexperienced team, scored a narrow victory 3-2 after a hard game in which our forwards took full advantage of their opportunities. Unfortunately this state of affairs did not last. In the next round we played Oriel—an altogether disastrous game. At half-time we were leading 4-0, but after the change over Oriel retaliated with such good effect that they drew level. In the extra time, although we renewed our pressure, our uncertainty in front of the goalmouth prevented us scoring the winning goal. In the replay the inexperience of our forwards once more told against us; they seemed to be quite incapable of finishing their attacking movements. Oriel scored the only goal at the very beginning of the game, and in spite of all our efforts we were unable to penetrate their defence. Over half the Cuppers team were cadets, and it is indeed unfortunate that they will not be with us next year, for the experience gained this season would have been invaluable for the future.

HERTFORD COLLEGE SQUASH RACQUET CLUB, 1945-6

The H.C.S.R.C. has had an active and fairly successful season: matches were played against Queen's, Jesus, Keble, Magdalen, and Oriel, victories being gained over Jesus and Keble, while Queen's were only successful after a close struggle. In Cuppers we were unfortunate to be drawn against New College in the first round. Mitchell playing as a substitute at fifth string was the only player to win his match, but injuries had kept Watts and Gray out of the side. The College was represented in Cuppers by the Secretary, the Captain, F. H. Pratt, R. C. Bell, and H. K. Mitchell. The most successful player was the Secretary, C. J. F. Upton, who played in the 'Varsity Trials and has been elected to the O.U. Squirrels. He received good support from the second string, M. V. G. F. Watts, and these two players were both awarded their College colours.

The Hertford Dramatic Society, which suspended its activities at the end of 1942, was triumphantly revived in Michaelmas Term 1945. Its officials for the year are: *President*, B. R. Roe; *Secretary*, R. B. Murray; *Treasurer*, E. D. Pendry. A number of successful meetings have been held at which plays have been read, with some assistance from members of the women's colleges. Special arrangements have been made with the management of the Playhouse by which members of the

Club are allowed to attend performances on Monday evenings at reduced rates. It is hoped to produce in Trinity Term 1946 a new play about the life of Shakespeare; the play has been written (or according to one rumour is still being written) by a modern poet who on this occasion has chosen prose as the vehicle for his thoughts. We hope that this entirely new start will be a happy augury for the Club's future.

The Hertford Chess Club has been meeting this winter side by side with the University Chess Club in the Old Hall every Tuesday night in term. The link between the activities of the two societies is provided by J. E. Jones, Captain of the College Club, who plays regularly for the University; he was a member of the team which defeated Cambridge in London on March 18th.

R. B. C. Glanfield, *Captain, R.A.C.*, Commoner 1939-40, died in India of multiple injuries on 13 August 1945, aged 24.

R. A. Hill, *Sub.-Lt., R.N.V.R.*, Commoner 1930-3, was lost at sea when his ship struck a mine on 30 April 1940, aged 27.

V. A. Kings, *Driver, Royal Signals*, Scholar 1935-8, died in Western Germany on 31 May 1945, aged 28.

D. F. McNeill, *Private, R.A.S.C.*, Commoner 1935-8, died on war service on 17 June 1944, aged 26.

E. A. F. Widdrington, *M.C., Major, 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards*, Commoner 1932-5, previously reported missing, now known to have been killed in action while serving with the 2nd Special Airborne Service Regt. in Italy in 1944, aged 29.

A. S. Williams, *Flight-Lt., R.A.F.*, Scholar 1940-1, killed in action in the Central Mediterranean in April 1944, aged 22.
