

Dear Hertford Community,

I write to you from the flight home from Asia, where I have greatly enjoyed time with our Singapore and Hong Kong alumni. It is superb to see the breadth of Hertford impact, across business, academia, government, civil society and much more. Thanks to everyone who joined us, and to alumna Pauline Yeung for projecting a Hertford welcome onto the Hong Kong skyline.



Meanwhile, Trinity Term is well underway. The Music Society held their Spring Concert earlier this week. We also hosted our popular (and record breaking) May Day public breakfast. A Hertford team will be joining the **70th anniversary** celebrations of the Bannister Mile on 6 May, and several of us will be attempting several slower miles at the Town and Gown 10K on 12 May. The irrepressible Will Hutton will be back on 9 May as part of the launch of his new book *This Time No Mistakes – How to Remake Britain*. Practicing and aspiring lawyers should look out for our latest online careers event for students and recent alumni on 15 May, and an in person gathering for alumni on how to be human in the legal profession in London on 20 June.

Later in term, Hertford alum (and now Head of NATO in Europe and Asia) Admiral Stuart Munsch is hosting an event here on 16 May. William Hague will speak before Guest Night on 23 May. We also have visits from the head of UK pandemic preparedness (the college needs him to do a top job), and the President of Latvia. **Summer Eights** is 25 May, with Simon Robinson's team once again hosting the celebrations at the most energetic boathouse on the river (as well as the Boat Club Dinner in Hall after). **Young alumni London drinks** are happening on 6 June. We'll host our second Pride breakfast on 8 June, with university and city leadership joining us. We hope to make it an annual tradition. Later that day, the Hertford cricket team (led by Rosie Wilson) will take on my XI, with nine – yes, nine - spaces still available for courageous alumni and tutors on my team. Do please hold the date for a spectacular 13 June event we are holding at The Sheldonian, with Kate Raworth, Kim Stanley Robinson, Laline Paull and other inspiring speakers: more details to follow.





One of the highlights of my job is leading the 'Head, Hand, Hertford' course each spring. Over two weeks we discussed purpose, communications, curiosity, leadership and much more, among an excellent group of students and visiting speakers. Filipa Paes has a better **summary here**. Several headteachers joined us, curious to participate in the discussions of the future of education. One exercise involved preparing me for a BBC R4 interview with only minutes of notice. As ever, I learnt much more than I taught.

Congratulations to Professor Sid Parameswaran for <u>winning a prestigious ERC</u> <u>Consolidator Grant</u> to deepen his team's research in moiré structures. The library team were <u>nominated for a VC's award</u> for their vital work in maintaining access to the library while we prepare to start its transformation. Music tutor Oliver Chandler won the <u>inaugural Adele Katz music prize</u> for early career researchers. Congratulations too to Honorary Fellow Soweto Kinch on his <u>new jazz programme</u> on Radio 3.

Governing Body has another busy term ahead, including deliberations over strengthening governance (alongside our meeting with the Charity Commission in late May); ensuring our size and shape is genuinely sustainable; and ambitious estate plans. We were sad to mark the death of Hertford alumnus Daniel Dennett, one of the most significant figures in modern philosophy and AI. <u>More here</u> on his life and work.



Over the Easter break, 'Reeling for Ukraine' raised money to rebuild homes damaged in the conflict. Of course, this term also takes place against the backdrop of the Israel/Gaza war. I have been trying to argue in the media for diplomacy and de-escalation. The Oxford Diplomacy Society just held its annual dinner here, with much discussion of how the next generation of policy makers can contribute to a more peaceful world. I was also involved over the break in the launch of a <u>new</u> report on the future of UK foreign policy, in response to which a Times columnist suggested that universities had become places that ideas go to die. In my experience here that could not be further from the truth.

I joined him for his last public appearance as Chancellor, and put together a tribute video with contributions from six Prime Ministers and

others. The plan is that voting for his successor will take place – online for the first time - through June and July. Alumni for whom the university have email addresses will receive personalised links to register.
